The Chandler family has had a quiet summer. This is a new experience for us in Maine. Summer 2006 was consumed with packing and moving and getting started here in the church and the community. Summer 2007 was dominated by family medical issues at the very start, and the death of my car in the very middle. Last year we had medical issues again at the start and the end of summer.

This year, thankfully, no friendly late night check-in chats at the SMMC emergency room. It is a blessed relief to be a health care “consumer” who is not consuming at quite the intensity of prior years.

Like everybody else, we have been darn near drowned during June and July and humidified half to death during August, but on balance, I'll take it.

How about you? How has your summer been? What have you been up to?

I hope you'll come by soon and tell us all about it. Sunday, Sept. 13, would be a good time to start catching up. It will be our first worship service of the new church year. I almost slipped and called it our first “regular” church service, but of course it is not. It will be back at 10 AM and back in our Sanctuary, but it will also be Homecoming Sunday. It will be, as for many years past, our special ritual to welcome the renewal of our bond of community.

For those who have been coming here for two months or two decades, it will be an opportunity to greet church friends you may not have seen regularly – or at all – since May or June. Obviously, the greeting is reciprocal. They haven't seen you either. RE-flections

The Religious Education program for our young people this year will focus on Unitarian Universalist identity. We are first of all a faith of promises to each other and to the larger community based on the principles to which we aspire. It is not always an easy task to share an evolving and changing faith based on ways of being in the world rather than on a set of fixed beliefs or traditions. It is our sincere hope that our young people will grow in their understanding of UU identity, learn the value of spiritual practice and exploration, and seek ways to make their faith one of action in the larger community.

We will have three groups this year:

Nursery – (Pre-K and K) will use the curriculum “Chalice Children.” The goals for this group cluster around the three “A’s” – affection, acceptance and achievement;

Grades 1-4 will use the curriculum “We Believe.” This curriculum focuses on our seven principles and seeks to develop appreciation for each through stories, games, activities and take-home experiences;

Grades 5-8 will use the “Toolbox of Faith” from the Tapestry of Faith Program being developed by the UUA. This program asks what tools we would put into a toolbox of our faith and what tools our faith provides for us. There will be time for worship, time for stories, time for service and time for fun. We expect this group will function as a junior youth group with planned activities such as sleepovers, bowling, and service projects.

We have a great group of teachers ready, willing and able to provide a meaningful and fun experience for young people this church year. We are looking forward to our time with them and hope parents will help us by encouraging regular attendance. Continuity is extremely important in making our program truly meaningful to all who participate.

Harbour Singers on the Move

In September of last year four people organized an open meeting to gauge community interest in forming a hospice comfort singing group in southern Maine. This church was happy to support the effort as a social justice mission, and offered the use of space for rehearsals, administrative support, and a non-profit umbrella. Unlike many risky investments these days, this one is beginning to pay off handsomely thanks to the efforts of Thayer M., Ellie R., Peggy B., Henry W., and more than 30 others who are giving their time and compassion to reach out with their music to people in end-of-life care.

While the emergence of Harbour Singers to full-fledged service has happened more slowly than originally planned, it is fair to say that the group is through the awkward stage of youth and is stepping into the world as intended. The delays had a variety of causes, including ill-timed winter weather and difficulties with the development and printing of our brochure which was critical to outreach and to relations with the hospice organizations. However, the brochures are now in stock and have been distributed to most of the key organizations which serve as our outreach supporters in identifying individuals and families who may want our services. And, of course, winter is behind us.

The Singers' roster includes 32 people from York and Cumberland counties. The Singers have had weekly rehearsals starting in October of last year, except for holidays and some time off this summer. The members' variety of musical experience is recognized by starting with full group rehearsal of core music, then working with smaller "bedside" sized groups, and slowly adding additional music. New members are welcome at any time. With assistance from three hospice organizations a training/orientation program was conducted for the members. It was designed to insure the singers have the knowledge and self-comfort to be present in situations involving end-of-life and attendant emotional and social concerns. The Singers have had six large group sings at nursing or assisted living facilities in the area, both for outreach and for practice. There have been four bedside sings, two in nursing homes and one in a home setting, as well as two memorial services and two presentations in church settings. Service will continue in these same venues but with increased presence in private homes as the four hospice organizations begin more active outreach with their clients.

Harbour Singers has a dedicated cell phone (286-7678), which is rotated to a volunteer contact manager for a two-week term. There is also a page on the church website and a separate website for the group now being completed at www.HarbourSingers.org. Taken together, along with e-mail, requests for service can be converted into a selection of singers who can respond as quickly as possible.

To date the feedback the Singers have received is what keeps them moving forward. They are welcomed with open arms by the facilities and their residents, blessed with embraces by family members at bedside, and encouraged to keep up the good work. While there is no claim of bringing professional musicians to the task (although there are some), the Harbour Singers are people who love to sing and love to share with others at a difficult time. This is definitely a calling!

Each week we heard from a different presenter who delivered a unique message highlighted with poetry, readings, personal thoughts and ideas and emotion. The summer offered a taste of many perspectives and practices not included in the regular schedule.

There were familiar faces and new people. We had "people from away" – visitors from Madison, WI, Fort Collins, CO, and Silver Springs, MD. There were individuals and families from Saco and Biddeford attending our church for the first time.

Thanks to the members who led each Sunday, Summer Services were successful. They filled a void for many long-time members and offered a significant way station for some summer visitors.

Green Committee Update

Our church has long been committed to energy conservation and environmental stewardship. We are a certified Green Sanctuary, accredited by the UU Ministry for Earth in Dec. 2005. We are soon due for a re-accreditation to retain our Green Sanctuary status, and are currently investigating what that involves. making the church more energy efficient, programs on resource sustainability and simple living, and a worship service to honor our connection to the natural world. Cut down on drafts and save on fuel this winter!

The Green Committee will again be making economical removable/reusable inside storm windows this fall. These double pane thermal window panels simply push into the widow frame with foam insulation around the edges. They triple the insulation factor of a single pane window, and block all air movement through it. The estimated savings in fuel cost for a single pane window is \$4 to \$10 per square foot of window per heating season.

We want to make these windows available to all members of the congregation. We ask that recipients help make the windows. The cost of a window depends on the size. We think a fair value of a typical sized window is around \$20 and request that you make a donation up to that value depending on your ability to pay. Money received will be used to cover the cost of materials for windows both for homes and for the church.

We plan to make windows on a Saturday morning each month this fall, starting on September 19. For more information or to order windows contact Mogens R. at home or through the church office. We will need the inside measurements (height and width) of each window to the nearest 1/8 inch to insure a tight fit. Please note that the inside of your window must be free of window shades, curtains, or hardware in the area where the storm window will sit.
