## Along the Way

Dear Friends,

Let me begin by thanking again the hosts of the cottage meetings in Saco/Biddeford and Sanford, the Transition Teams in both churches who have done so much to arrange them and the members who have given part of their Sunday afternoons to attend. The decisions before you are among the most crucial for churches in our self-governing tradition: it's important to remember that the search and call process for a settled minister in Unitarian Universalism is entirely in the hands of the congregation. While guided by certain designated, UUA specialists and trained interim ministers such as me, in the end, most of the actual work and the final decisions will be yours. Therefore, in order to obtain the best possible match between minister and congregation in our diverse religious association, it is important to have as much participation as possible, especially now as each church seeks to discern both what it needs and what it can offer in ministry.

Themes emerging from the cottage meetings in Sanford, due to be completed February 5, will be considered in relation to those that came from the meetings in Saco/Biddeford and together, will form a picture of how each congregation sees itself at this time: what are the needs and desires, strengths and challenges of each in regard to the future and to the question of professional ministry.

The shared ministry of Rev. Sue to your churches was something of an evolution, as each church on its own made decisions in regard to finances and desire for professional ministry. Perforce, within each church, active lay leadership developed to provide for worship and pastoral care in what had become for each a half-time arrangement. This evolved system has worked for two years or so.

The question I am now going to ask each church to answer is this: Do you wish further to evolve what grew into a mutual, half-time arrangement into an intentional, shared ministry of the two churches in regard to a full-time equivalent, settled minister serving both congregations? Not all details of such a potential shared ministry are necessarily clear at this moment--much would undoubtedly remain un-

changed—but the answer to this question will be critical to the direction of a ministerial search. To search intentionally for a single, shared, full-time equivalent minister (a path many small churches have taken together) will leverage the finances and energies of both congregations, enlarge the pool of potential ministers, maximize your chances and engage the full resources of the UUA Transition Department. (It would also mean, for example, the selection and commissioning of a joint search committee.) To search for two, half-time ministers will send both churches in another direction entirely, requiring two separate searches in a smaller pool of ministers and working with the regional UUA staff who handle less than full time searches. Each church would then be on its own in regard to financing the search by itself and the compensation package it could offer to potential ministers.

The discernment themes gathered from the cottage meetings will soon be shared with both congregations. Please consider them fully as well as your own thoughts in this regard. I will ask each church to express its will on this question, probably in separate congregational meetings called for that purpose, so that we have a clear sense how to proceed. While we are not too late in the usual search timeline, we should move ahead on this within the month.

While it is possible that each church could continue to pursue its own destiny separately for some years to come, given the economic and demographic realities of the area, it is my considered professional opinion that an intentional, shared ministry will offer you the best path to a sustainable future as vital, thriving churches bringing to your towns the important, saving message of Unitarian Universalism.

There is still time for sharing and discussion about this important question. If you have not attended a Sanford cottage meeting, I hope you will. In any case, in each church, I encourage you to share thoughts on this with your Transition Team, your Board or with me.

## Music Notes

**Music Notes from Choir Director, Ellie R.**

**"Song is the wind chime of memory"** unattributed author

**The History of UU Hymnody, continued:** The Beacon Press in Boston originally published "Hymns of the Spirit" back in 1937; the copies that we have are the 17<sup>th</sup> printing and were published in 1960. The first section is comprised of 16 "Services of Religion"; the second section, which makes up the bulk of the book, is a collection of over 500 hymns. The Unitarian and the Universalist Commissions on Hymns and Services compiled the contents of this book jointly for use in the "free churches of America".

The introduction to the order of service section states "these services are not offered as prescribed forms which require literal adherence...Where they do not fit the need of a given congregation or minister they can be altered..." However, it goes on to say that "the editors would only urge that such alterations... be not made hastily or carelessly, but with discrimination and sound judgment. Personal idiosyncrasies in the utterance of opinion or erratic modes of procedure on the part of the minister inevitably distract the attention of the worshipper and mar the effect the service is intended to have."

**Morning Song:** At 9:50 one Sunday each month I am in the sanctuary leading 'gathering singing'. Please join us in singing! If you prefer not to sing, please sit quietly in the sanctuary and enjoy the music or gather with friends in the parish hall or hallway for conversation. The next 'Morning Song' is February 19.

**TriQuire:** Rehearsals for TriQuire are under way. The combined choirs from Saco, Sanford and Kennebunk will join voices and sing in Kennebunk on March 5, Saco March 12 and Sanford March 19. The general theme of the services will be about the Sabbath – saving time to renew oneself. We hope you will attend the March 12 service to be renewed through word and song!

**Choir Rehearsals will be held Sunday Mornings from 8:45-9:45 on February 19 and 26.**

### Worship Assistants Wanted!

#### Gathering on Sunday, February 12 at 11:15am in the Parlor.

Please help ensure that the ministers and lay people who lead our Sunday Services are not left alone to provide all the components of the service. Here's a list of the "Who, What, Where, When and Why" of being a Worship Assistant. Our gathering on February 12 will provide you with all the information you need and a support network to help you. If you have questions please contact Jane P. ([jperkins17@maine.rr.com](mailto:jperkins17@maine.rr.com))

#### Who:

Worship Assistants are lay people who are familiar with our regular service and are willing to do the dreaded (most people fear it *more than death* itself!) deed of speaking a few, pre-written lines of the Service from the Savage Lectern in the Chancel.

#### What:

The Worship Assistant contacts the Service Leader a few days before Sunday to find out if there are particular needs he or she has for the Service. The Worship Assistant should then meet with the Service Leader, usually ½ hour before the service, to verify what, if any, parts of the service the Leader would like the Assistant to handle. These parts will usually be the Welcome and Announcements, and could also be the Unison Chalice Lighting (Our Covenant), the Peace Candle Affirmation, Sharing from the Heart (Joys and Concerns), the Offering and Singing Response, and/or Extinguishing the Chalice Flame.

#### Where:

All events happen at the church unless the Worship Assistant and the Service Leader meet elsewhere sometime before the Sunday Service. The Worship Assistant sits in the chair behind the Savage Lectern in the Chancel.

#### When:

The Worship Assistant should be at the church ½ hour before the service to meet the Service Leader and confirm what he or she wants the Worship Assistant to do. The Worship Assistant should test his or her voice with the microphone on the lectern before people begin to fill the Sanctuary and should be seated in the Chancel about 5 minutes before the service begins.

#### Why:

There are a variety of "generic" parts to our Sunday Service – Welcome, Lighting the Chalice, Sharing from the Heart, Our Covenant, etc. The Service Leader often has many things on which to concentrate (the sermon or talk, prayers, moments of meditation) in addition to these "generic" parts. It is appropriate to have an Assistant available to handle those "generic" parts of the service if the Leader wants someone to do so.

## More News

### Capital Campaign Up-date

Here's a quarterly up- date on the Capital Campaign. You'll recall that there were four major areas of research/ discernment that had to be done - Explore Our Heritage; Assess Our Building; Determine Our Public Value and Identify Our Partners. The Heritage bit has been completed, but we will be doing on going presentations, events and such around that subject. Thanks to David Nadeau who helped with research for the 189th birthday observance and to Sophie, who helped with photography. And of course to all of you who attended the discussion. As well as Dick Skillin who is doing some work on our time line. Mogens did a great job of completing the Building Assessment which gives us a dandy baseline. Niki and Anne C. have completed the Public Value work. This is a very interesting and eye opening exercise which I'm sure they will share with us soon. Jean Horton has begun work on the last section: Identifying Our Partners. The plan is to have all these basic steps completed by Jan. 31. We will then begin the next step in the process which entails more of the gearing up for action work. Al Casad has done some basic investigation of the grants we might apply for when he gets back for his trip we will start work on this process. We have invited several knowledgeable folks to meet with us on Jan. 29 after church to talk about the work we want to do in terms of projected costs. (We have been able to get lower quotes locally.) We also want to discuss adding the up date of our current electrical system particularly in the Sanctuary area to our list of projects. (We have been able to get a local electrician to review our system and give us a report about needs in this area.) More next month. Betsey and Anne D.

### Land Acquisition Update

Betsey, Niki and I were able to be at the Workshop session on Jan. 9. The Council recommended (on the advice of the City Attorney) that the UUCCSB determine for sure who owns the land that we occupy. (We have already contacted Eric Cote to verify this recommendation and to ask guidance.) Not one councilor indicated any resistance to our getting some sort of official document or agreement. There were many ideas expressed about how to proceed on this. Of course this was the Council's first brush with this issue. I expect that it will not be their last. Also, Mayor Michaud was very generous in his introduction and his suggestions about this. The Journal Tribune ran a great article about this on Jan. 12. A copy of the article is posted on the bulletin board outside the office. Please, if you are a Saco resident, contact your Councilperson to ask his support for this request. If you are not a Saco resident; contact Mayor Michaud about your interest and support of our request.

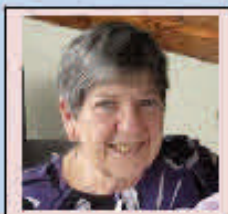


## Faith in Action Team (FIAT)

#### Islamophobia Personal Reflection by Dorinne Spirito member of UUCSB

Twenty-two years ago my daughter met in graduate school a Muslim man from Turkey. They eventually became engaged and married. During the 1990's many of us Americans were less educated about the Middle Eastern countries and Islamic cultures. When I shared with folks that my daughter was engaged to a man from Turkey, many would ask, "Do you know how Middle Eastern men treat women?" My response was to say, "My daughter's fiancé seems like a very kind, respectful person; and I trust that my daughter has good judgment and is aware of the cultural differences."

At that time there was a lot of negative press about oppression of women in the Middle East. Most people in the nineties were somewhat more sensitive to prejudice against African Americans, Hispanics, and other minorities in this country, but expressed no sensitivity to prejudice against the Muslim culture. I felt offended that people were so negative about Muslims, and my daughter's life choices.

My husband and I, and my daughter's family, had a most enjoyable visit to Turkey, where we were welcomed and treated most hospitably by my son-in-law's family and where we learned some of the traditions and ways of this different culture and religion. I have come to believe that people are people no matter where they come from, and whatever religion they practice. I believe Islam is a very non-violent, peaceful, prayerful way of life.

Today, with mass social media and global travel, we have to face our anti-Muslim prejudice - even in Maine, where we have had an influx of Muslim immigrants. I am sad to admit that I, at times, feel impatient and biased towards some of these folks. Islamophobia is present in this country. Due to the past year's political climate, fear and ignorance are rampant. In Westbrook and Lewiston there have been incidents of anti-Muslim hate speech and crimes. Today, I want to do whatever I can to help these people feel comfortable, respected, and thankful to be in our state.

Except for Native Americans, we are all immigrants in the US! Growing up in a French community, referred to as "Frog Hollow", in Hartford, CT, I learned firsthand about cultural prejudice. Marrying a first generation Italian-American, I am also sensitive to past anti-Italian prejudice. I can only imagine what prejudices challenge African Americans, Hispanics, Jews, and other minorities. Yet, most of us, if honest with ourselves, can admit to being prejudiced toward one or more groups of people.

Now, more than ever, we need to be vigilant about our speech and behaviors towards all of our neighbors! Immigrants, Republicans, Democrats, those who are educated and those who are not!
