Along the Way

Dear Friends,

Throughout my ministries, I have often found that someone will say to me after a service, "That was a wonderful reading (or prayer or benediction!) Where can I get a copy of that?" It's always gratifying when I can say, "That's easy; it's in the back of our hymnal;" to which I hear "Really? That kind of thing is in our hymnal? I had no idea!" Yes, it's in that very book you open during a service to a specified hymn or reading, than flip closed and don't look at again.

That the hymnal is so largely unexplored by most UU's has to be ascribed, I am sorry to say, to our ministers and lay worship leaders. To us, it is a very familiar and well used worship planning resource, so familiar and well used, perhaps, that we take it for granted and are surprised to learn that not everyone flips so confidently as we to the "Index of First Lines and Titles of Readings," for example. So herewith, a very quick, guided tour of that mysterious gray book you see in front of you every Sunday--our hymnal, formally titled, "Singing the Living Tradition."

A glance at the Table of Contents will show that all the hymns and readings are organized to reflect the five sources of our living tradition (listed in the front on the sixth leaf, just below the more well-known "Principles"): transcending mystery and wonder, words and deeds of prophetic women and men, wisdom from the world's religions, Jewish and Christian traditions, and humanist teachings. There are 415 hymns and other pieces of music (so we don't really need to use the same 60 every year) and 317 readings (beginning at selection 416) that reflect the very wide spectrum of UU worship life and social concerns. I urge you to come early some Sunday and spend a minute just leafing through the hymns and readings—I guaran-

tee you will find many of them beautiful and profound.

For extra credit, take a glance at the indices that follow the readings, beginning on page 635. If, for example, you can remember the first few words of a hymn but not the title, the Index of First Lines and Titles of Hymns can help you find it--likewise for readings. If you know there is a hymn you like about autumn but can't remember the title, look in the Topical Index of Hymns under *Seasons and Cycles*. If you would like to find something comforting to send to a friend who has suffered a loss, you might look in the Topical Index of Readings under *Memorial and Funeral Services*.

The more musical among us may be interested in the Metrical Index of Tunes, and if you think there is something in there by Albert Schweitzer but can't remember what, the Index of Composers, Arrangers, Authors, Translators, and Sources will tell you that it is reading #447, which speaks of how we rekindle one another's lights in times of need.

A denomination's hymnals (we have had many) are a portrait of its heart and soul during a particular era. After 20 or 30 years perhaps, the need for a new hymnal becomes evident. Supplements will have been published, modifications urged, until finally, the monumental effort and expense of a new edition will be undertaken. The new one will retain the gold refined in the fire of years' use, the dross will be discarded and much new material added. It too, will be the heart and soul of common worship for a new people in a new time. While it is not perfect, we have been well served in our time by "Singing the Living Tradition" and I commend it to your attention.

The History of UU Hymnody, continued: The hymns found in the green supplement "Hymns in New Form for Common Worship" (first published in 1979) are revisions of hymns found in the blue "Hymns for the Celebration of Life." The preface states, "We seek to move beyond gender in the language of our worship. The old patriarchal forms are contrary to present needs and ideals. If any portion of a congregation feels excluded by words sung or spoken in unison, the words fail to express the intended community... Just as in the past Universalists removed hell and Unitarians eliminated the trinity by recasting old hymns, this brief collection provided change that should make many hymns more appropriate for our time."

The preface goes on to explain that while some changes were a simple matter of changing pronouns, others "required recasting whole phrases to keep rhyme, meter, and balance."

Morning Song: At 9:50 one Sunday each month I am in the sanctuary leading 'gathering singing'. Please join us in singing! If you prefer not to sing, please sit quietly in the sanctuary and enjoy the music or gather with friends in the parish hall or hallway for conversation. The next 'Morning Song' is March 12.

TriQuire: TriQuire hits the road this month. The combined choirs from Saco, Sanford and Kennebunk will join voices and sing in Saco March 12, Sanford March 19 and Kennebunk March 26. Since the election in November and even more since the inauguration of President Trump, FIAT meetings and conversations have had an increased sense of urgency. For some in my circle, and sometimes for me, there has been a pervasive fear about the future. I ask: Where do I start? How much is enough? How do I stay calm? I try to let my faith be my guide.

Talk about faith used to make me feel very uncomfortable. It's very personal and recalled experience from my youth about "witnessing for God". I hadn't yet learned to talk about my faith as a Unitarian Universalist. During my work on the 2012 marriage equality campaign I attended a workshop for faith leaders about how to speak with people about faith in relationship to the issue. It didn't take much reflection to see how our UU belief in *the inherent worth and dignity of every person* was the ticket and I quickly became comfortable and confident in talking to strangers about what my faith told me.

Working on social justice issues as a member of a church requires that we be able to articulate our beliefs. Last year FIAT focused on race issues (*inherent worth and dignity*), climate change (*interdependent web*) and Ranked Choice Voting (*use of the democratic process*). In the light of current post-election concerns, especially the hullabaloo around "fake news", it is clear to me that the 4th principle "a free and responsible search for truth and meaning" encompasses all of these and will lead me to act on free speech issues in the near future.

I didn't realize until beginning to write this piece that a FIAT meeting is a time to apply our 3rd principle of *encouragement to spiritual growth*. Opportunities for spiritual growth abound in light of the political and social issues of the day. There are questions of morality: What is the right thing and who am I to say what is right? There are questions of mortality: What are my limits and how will I spend my time? It is no wonder that we feel fraught and on edge!

We bring some shared spiritual practices to FIAT meetings. By lighting a chalice with a moment of shared centering we prepare our hearts and minds to address these deep questions. When we extinguish it with a benediction we are reminded that we are connected and part of a circle that does not end.
