

Words from 2005

Many years ago I had a conversation with an ex-minister of this congregation. I asked him, "Why do people go to church?" His answer to me was, "because they have to." I asked him what he meant by that, and he explained, "Some people need to search out other people - they need to reach out and be close - they need to search as a group for a common faith. They have to feel the companionship of their fellow man in order to be whole."

I have thought of that many times in the years that followed, and I have to admit I am one of those people. I come to this church for very selfish reasons. I need the warmth of friendship. I bask in the feeling of family here. I know with a certain surety that we are a family in the true, pure sense of the word.

When we come here on Sundays and other days, I know people mean it when they ask how I am. I know that if I needed a kind word, it would be here for me. I know that if I needed help, it would be given without question. I know I am cared for and know how much I care for them.

I have had my own personal experience with that sudden need when I was struck by a car on the streets of Portland. As I recovered later and struggled with my pain, I had minions of people step forward to offer their help and support, to cook for us, to wash my floors, do my laundry, and sit with me so that Don could escape to mow the lawn and get away from things for a moment. All of this was given without question.

I have seen this church congregation come together time after time. To close ranks to aid our past minister when she had a diagnosis of cancer. To help in times of bereavement, trouble with the frailties of day to day living. All of this. We all could tell endless stories of what the people of this congregation mean to us all.

We all believe different things, search in our own separate ways, have our strong political and social views, but we care. We care about ourselves, we care about our families. We care about our community and our world. And we do something about it. We stand up. We speak out. And we all love one another. That is why I come to church.

Share the Plate, June 2019

Each month our congregation shares a portion of the Sunday morning offering with organizations that reflect our 7 principles. It is a way we expand our practice beyond the walls of our building;

Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, Queer+ Collection.

The Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, Queer+ Collection at the University of Southern Maine collects and preserves the history of Maine's LGBTQ+ communities. We collect the papers of individuals and the records of organizations active in these communities. The collection includes all forms of material culture from printed books, pamphlets, posters, to manuscripts, diaries, to objects, buttons, T-shirts, banners, games, a wide variety of ephemera, to photographs and audiovisual material. Following professional standards, we carefully guard the privacy of individuals involved in the collections.

The LGBTQ+ Collection is arguably the most significant and comprehensive collection of primary materials documenting the history and culture of Maine's 20-21st century lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, and queer communities. Its Collection Advisory Committee actively seeks new collections and creates programming that educates and empowers Maine.



Styrofoam containers and, my personal favorite - used facial tissue!






