

Shay's Musings

Tending Fires by Rev. Lindasusan V. Ulrich

Kieran was a curious child, interested in everything that the grown-ups in the village could teach them. The one thing Kieran wasn't interested in, though? Waiting.

Kieran often watched Naima, one of the village's Fire Tenders, take her time placing each piece of kindling just so, stacking smaller branches on top, and then carefully propping the full logs into a cone. The slowness of it made Kieran practically twitch. "Ms. Naima, why can't you just throw all of it into the fire pit together? It's all going to burn anyway."

Naima smiled. "Kieran, fires need to breathe. You have to be patient as you build them or the air won't flow properly."

Kieran also liked to visit Talia, a seamstress. As she tied a knot in her thread, she eyed her young companion. "Kieran, dear, I sew love into every stitch of everything I make. That's what makes each piece special. The process takes time, but it's worth it."

Walking home, Kieran noticed that Farad still hadn't finished the well he'd been digging over the weekend. Farad wiped dirt off his forehead with a cloth. "Friend, there's much more to digging a well than getting out a shovel and removing some soil. For example, I have to line the sides with stone so the water will be safe for drinking. I can't rush something like that."

A few days later, Kieran came running home after school, tears streaming down their face. After finding Auntie Viv in the garden, Kieran shared the story in a rush of words. "I was walking home through the park because it's such a nice day, and as I went past some oak trees, I saw this boy hassling someone. And he was saying all kinds of awful things about her family, and her hair, and her house, and she was crying. So without even thinking, I swooped in and told him he'd better leave her alone, and then I grabbed her hand and we ran away."

"What do you think you got wrong?"

"Well, you're always telling me I should be more patient and wait things out, but I jumped right in instead. I'm sorry, Auntie Viv."

"Kieran, injustice always deserves a response. You interrupted harm from continuing. Will I still worry when you leap before you look? Of course. But it took courage to defend your friend. Building justice takes time and care, sweetheart. If we do it right, though, it will be a justice that lasts."

This was the story for all ages told during the closing worship service at the UUA General Assembly this past June. The conference was focused on exploring possibilities for transformation found through cooperation and collaboration. I'm excited to share some of what I experienced while I was there, and to see where these messages may take us.



Building News



From the Archives

Up on the roof top.... So,we've been talking about our church roof a great deal this summer. Here's some recent history about the roof onthe part of our building known as the Sanctuary.

In Oct. of 1997, work began on replacing our old and leaky roof in this part of our building. "The weatherman predicted rain and the workmen went home for the night having placed a protective tarp over the unshingled portion of the roof. They awakened next morning to find that there had been a rain of 'Biblical' proportion. Part of the Sanctuary ceiling was lying on the floor." (from Houses of Worship, Saco Maine.) In a strange coincidence in 2008 while a repair of the Sanctuary roof was taking place a similar situation occurred. This time with less damage, but still with chunks of ceiling in the pews!

In April 2010 a special congregational meeting was held to vote on replacement of the west side of the Sanctuary roof. You can see a copy of the minutes posted in the Parish Hall. Sort of "deja view" all over again! In June 2013 we fixed roof leaks around the steeple stump.

In 2015, we "water proofed" the steeple stump.
In 2019 while getting a quote to once again seal up the leaks around the base of our steeple; we discovered that the north side of our annex roof, which we had neglected due to all the drips in the Sanctuary, was in dire straights.

And on it goes!!



We are looking forward to seeing everyone at the first church service in September. The Caring Connection: Marilyn C., Anne C., Donna R., Gloria S., & Pat S.




Puzzle/Books Shelf

Our Membership:

Those who sign the Membership Book agree to sustain our church through continuing contributions of time, effort and financial support. All members are part of the non-profit corporation that owns the church, and they govern it through democratic process in which each one is entitled to be heard. Members elect a Board of Trustees and must also approve the "call" of a minister to our pulpit.
