#### 2<sup>nd</sup> Monday Discussion Group

On the 2<sup>nd</sup> Monday of the month, anyone who is able can come join us in the Parish Hall for presentations, small group discussions, and lunch! Facilitated by Rev. Shay, these gatherings will focus on topics relevant to our lives today, ranging from exploring some deeper spiritual practices to dealing with mental health issues.

### 3<sup>rd</sup> Monday Vespers 7:00 p.m.

A vespers service is an evening worship/prayer service, usually more contemplative than a Sunday morning service. Once a month, I will be leading a 45 minute vespers service in the Parish Hall – a time for music, poetry, and meditation. All are welcome.

#### **Brown Bag Suppers**

You are invited to bring your own supper and join me at the church for casual conversation twice a month: on the 1<sup>st</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> Wednesdays of each month from 5:00 p.m. to 6:00 p.m.

# Shay's Musings

There has been some confusion about where, when, and how I spend my time with you, so I would like to lay it out day by day in the hopes that it may help alleviate any concerns and answer any questions.

A year and a half into this ministry with you, I have learned some things about how the congregations work and what your expectations are; I have learned some things about how this shared collaborative ministry of two



churches makes unique demands on my presence and time; and there are still many things for me to figure out.

The two Boards, my Ministerial Relations Team, and I have been in conversation since last Fall about where my time and energy can best be used to serve each congregation, and the partnership between the two. On any given day, Sanford's needs can be very different from Saco's needs – and those needs change constantly. I depend on your elected leaders to help me keep my attention on where the priorities are. We don't always get it right, but that won't stop us from trying.

Because of the uniqueness of this ministry, it has become obvious that I need to be a little more flexible and adaptable with my schedule than usual. If I plan to be in Saco on a Monday, but something critical comes up in Sanford that day, I have to be able to adjust.

And I understand that there is also a need for me to be stationary, to be where you know you can find me if you need me. So we're going to continue trying to get this to work for everyone and here's the new plan:

Mondays: Saco Office Hours 9:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m.

Wednesdays: Sanford Office Hours 9:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m.

At any other time on Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday, I am available to you by appointment, whether it be in Sanford, in Saco, at your home, at a coffee shop, at a hospital, etc. Just call, text, or email me, to set up a time to meet — even if it's only a half hour in advance. If I can answer immediately, I will. If not, I'll get back to you as soon as I can.

It is important to remember that even though I am "in the office" on Monday and Wednesday mornings, things come up or people stop in, so I strongly encourage you to call, text, or email before you stop by the church just to make sure I am available to be with you. However, if you are going to be around for other reasons, please stop in to say hello – you will always be welcome!

So now the question is: what do I do with the rest of my time?

On Mondays, Tuesdays, and Wednesdays when I am not in the office, I am visiting congregants, reaching out to the larger community in different ways, developing relationships with local interfaith colleagues, preparing and facilitating Adult RE programs, participating in tasks and events for the larger UU world, and lots and lots of meetings.

Sundays are focused on worship with the two congregations.

Thursdays are set aside as my worship preparation days, including research, reading, and writing my sermons, as well as planning other aspects of each service. On these days, my availability is limited – I will be answering emails and phone calls when I can, but I try not to schedule appointments or meetings.

On Fridays, my Sabbath, I am available for emergencies only by phone or text. I will not be reading or answering emails, or scheduling any church activities.

On Saturdays, I'm available as needed for special congregational and community events, as well as weddings and memorials; I am also spending time finalizing things for worship the next morning.

And finally, where am I when I'm not with you?

My Letter of Agreement (the covenant which binds us and defines our relationship), which is a standard UUA document for ministers and churches, stipulates the conditions of my employment, including my time on the job and my time away. Here's how it works:

I am committed to working a "standard" work week. Generally, I try to keep that to around 45 hours a week. Sometimes it's way more than that, and so I balance those extra-long weeks with some shorter ones when I need to.

I am given the same holidays off as any other employee.

I am given 10 sick days a year.

All denominational activities are part of my job, so when I go to General Assembly or minister gatherings, I am working.

I am responsible for all worship services, including rites of passage and special holidays, except for one Sunday each month, as well as the Sundays during my vacation and study leave. Generally, ministers plan about 20 hours of work for each worship service. This means I am constantly thinking about, researching, planning, or writing for a service. 20 hours a week is a lot of time, especially to fit in with all the other things I am responsible for, so I get one Sunday off a month to allow me to focus more time on things other than worship. This allows me to spread the 60+ hours a month that I *am* doing worship planning out over four weeks instead of three.

I am given eight weeks of leave per year. Four of those weeks are vacation, and I am completely free of all church duties during that time. Four of those weeks are study leave, during which I am using my time in ways that increase my capacity as a minister and contribute to my ability to serve you, ie. retreats, conferences, classes, research/reading, etc. During study leave I am available to you on a limited basis, and will respond to communications when I am able.

It has become clear that I have been remiss in communicating with you about when I will be away, and I apologize for that. From this point forward, there will always be an announcement in the weekly email blast, the Sunday order of service, and the newsletters for when I know I will be gone.

I'm hoping this article has been helpful, and will clear up any lingering confusion about my time. If you still have any questions or would like to discuss any of this with me, please let me know. I'd be happy to talk with you.

It is an honor to be serving you and a blessing to have this opportunity to transform our lives together. And I have to believe in strong boundaries — moving back and forth between the two churches, moving back and forth between my home here and Diana's home in NH, aids in the possibility of fatigue. And what kind of a minister would I be if I preach about self-care and maintaining a balanced life from the pulpit while not following those suggestions myself? I want to be the best minister I can be for you, and that requires me to pay attention to my needs as well as yours, and I want to be here with you for a long time, so we'll just keep working on figuring out what works best for all of us.

There is a lot to share this month. First of all a big congratulations is in order for all who worked hard to create a fabulously successful auction this year. A lovely event that earned a record amount of money. A thank you to all who participated in the auction as well, your generosity has moved the needle into new territory.

Last Sunday the Membership Committee hosted a brunch after church to dedicate the Family Space in the Sanctuary. Thank you for the lovely brunch. I also want to recognize the folks who worked together to create the Family Space. A big thanks to Matt Gerken, Mogens Ravn, Ben Caron, Alex Caron, Mark Young, Ron Hiser and Jeannine Wilson. They all gave their time and talents to create a lovely space for families in our church and it was a treat to work together with them on this project.

The Board of Trustees has been participating in a UUA sponsored program on Small Churches. Over 2/3 of UU Churches have memberships of less than 150 members, so small churches are what most of us UU's find when we go to church. The first installment shared how some small churches have invested in important community support efforts. Their efforts in reaching out into the community has united the church members in doing something that is important to them and enriched their connection with the broader community. The next topic was to explore the idea of right sizing your church to fit with its size and capacity. Churches with fewer than 120 members simply cannot sustain a "full service church model" so they must make choices as to what is important and pare down their church model to what they decide is a sustainable level. The most recent video talked about being a beloved community and the small steps we can take to deepen our connections with each other and open our hearts and arms to others. This is a good series of presentations, with ideas and perspectives that are thought provoking and important for the board to consider and ultimately bring to the congregation.

Finally, the annual Pledge Campaign will be starting in March. We will be asking folks to volunteer to host a pledge campaign gathering in their home. Small group gatherings to talk about the church, the budget and then to consider what your pledge will be for the year have been done before and proven to be popular with members. We will be kicking things off on March 8. Please consider hosting a campaign event in your home. The Pledge Campaign Committee this year is Pat Snyder, Anne Wood, Matt Gerken and myself.

# To Those Who Bring Small Children to Church:


There you are at church. Your baby or toddler is restless. Perhaps even a little boisterous. You try to silence them, and nothing. You try to pacify them with food or toys, and nothing. Eventually, you resort to the last thing you wanted to do: you pick them up, and before a watching audience, you make the march out of the church. All the while you're a little embarrassed, maybe a little frustrated, too. You might even think to yourself, "There's no point in coming to church. I get nothing out of it because I have to constantly care for my kid."

I want you – mothers and/or fathers – to know just how encouraging you are to so many. The elderly woman who often feels alone beams with a smile at the sight of you wrestling with your little one. She's been there before. She knows how hard it can be, but she smiles because to hear that brings back precious

memories. Seeing your parents and their small children brightens her day; she may have just received bad news about her health; but seeing the vitality of young ones removes – if but for a moment – her fears. The older man who always seems to be grouchy notices you, too. He's always talking about how children in this day have no respect or sense of goodness. But he sees you – a young family, in church every week. Like clockwork, he can depend on the sight of you and your young family. You give him hope that maybe the church isn't doomed after all, because there are still young parents who love God enough to bring their restless children to church.

Bring your children to church! If we don't hear crying, the church is dying. As hard as it might be for you as a parent who's half asleep, keep on doing what you're doing. You are an encouragement, and you're starting off your children's lives as you should.

# **Annual Pledge Campaign**

# Paying It Forward.....

Melanie Coombs wrote in the Jan 30, 2020 Courier Library column links about the legacy left to the City of Biddeford by Robert McArthur back in the late 1800s. Robert McArthur was a firm believer in life long learning. He came to the US in 1842. When his father died, he found work as a bobbin boy in a local mill. He was eight years old at the time. Robert rose to become the superintendent of the various mills in Massachusetts before coming to Biddeford as mill superintendent. Robert, a member of the First Universalist Church of Biddeford, was a generous supporter of learning and humane treatment of workers. His gifts and bequests live on today in Biddeford - the McArthur Apartments and the McArthur Library being constant reminders of this forward thinking man who made sure that reading was free and open to everyone in our community.



# Share the Plate Share the Leadership



# A Letter from the Capital Campaign Committee

Dear Church members & friends,

Are you tired of a capital campaign that seems to go on and on? We the members of the committee definitely are. Like you, we began 3+ years ago with great excitement & anticipation. Our church needs & wishes were extensive, so we aimed high, hoping to raise \$350,000. We knew that our congregation was not wealthy, but we hoped that members & friends would pledge enough to attract grants & community donations.

As you know, we did not come close to our goal, but we do have lots to celebrate. You pledged more than \$75,000, which has been used to support and partially skirt the Parish Hall and restore the front center Sanctuary Window. Next steps include completing the skirting, repairing the Parish Hall inside, and restoring the two windows on either side of the center front Sanctuary window. We continue to dream about replacing the cupola, repairing the commonly used entrance, and then replacing the blue carpet; and so much more...

We kept asking and hoping for pledge increases as well as participation from more members (to date 53% of members have pledged). To attract grants we need 90+ % of our members financially supporting the Capital Campaign. We understand that some donations won't or can't be large but any donation would show a congregational commitment.

We think it's time now to appreciate what we have accomplished, close this campaign, take a break, rethink what our priorities are, and decide how we might accomplish them. It is not up to us, the CC committee, to make that decision. You are the ones who authorized the pledge campaign. You are the ones to decide whether to end it or not.

There will likely be conversation at the Annual Meeting as well as a vote. In the meantime please share your thoughts, ideas, questions, dreams, talents and treasure. The CC committee thanks you for your thoughtful consideration in how you can help maintain and preserve our historic, beloved church.



#### **Conflict Resolution Process**

Please read the Conflict Brochure developed by this committee and follow the Conflict Resolution Pathway that applies to your situation. When needed, the CoM will assist in developing a mediation plan for all involved parties.

Keep in mind that the CoM doesn't handle anonymous input. Be assured that information communicated will be handled with appropriate confidentiality.


To learn more about our faith and practice:
