A couple of years ago, I was fortunate enough to be able to visit Hawaii with my family. On a morning outing to see Waimea Falls, as we walked through the park, an older Hawaiian woman called us over to a small table sitting in the shade of a pop-up tent. Laid on the table before her were various items native to the local culture. She saw me looking at a small flute and picked it up, telling me that it was, "a Hawaiian nose flute."

I had never heard of such a thing – playing a musical instrument with your nose!?! My surprise must have shown on my face, for she lifted the flute to her face and played a short tune for us.

"Do you know why we play the flute with our noses?" she asked me.

"Our mouths talk. Out of them come all sorts of meanness and nasties, sometimes without even thinking, and then they can't be taken back. They settle, here, in the heart, hurting, an open wound, forever out there, hurting."

"With the pureness of our breath," she continued, "we can soothe, heal, create beauty and put it out into the world."

I asked, "Can you play and sing at the same time?"

With a great laugh she said, "I"ll try!"

And she tried. And she did play and chant at once, clumsily, beautifully, as we all laughed in joy.

Then she smiled brilliantly and said, "Anything is possible!" and handed me a small woven frond square that sat perfectly in the palm of my hand.

"This is a possibility ball. To remind you anything is possible!"

I thought of an argument I had had that morning.

I thought of the possibility of letting go of words, inadequate and troublesome; the possibility of magically breathing out pureness and truth, apology, compassion, understanding, forgiveness.

I thought of the possibility of breathing in - deeply - peace, light, connection... and breathing out a song of love.

I thought of magic and mystery, of embracing both and laughing with glee, proclaiming, "I'll try!" when life says, "Anything is possible!"

"Those who don't believe in magic will never find it."

I'd like to be one of the people who believes in magic; who believes anything is possible.

Holiday Cheer was brought to 2 local families thanks to YOU!

As soon as the Board of Trustees made the decision to "adopt" 2 families for Christmas 2020, the gifts came rolling in. Twenty-one families, both members *and* friends, generously donated to this community project.

One family was chosen for us by WIONN (Welcome Immigrants Our New Neighbors) and consisted of Mom and 3 children, ages 11 to 16 years, living in Biddeford. The other family, living in Saco, was chosen for us by the social worker, guidance counselor and ELL teacher at Fairfield School which is right behind our church. This family included Mom, Dad and 5 children, ages 2 months to 20 years old.

As of Dec. 21st this is what you had given:

\$300 in grocery gift cards, \$300 in department store gift cards, TA & BHS hooded sweat-shirts for 4 students, afghans, hats, gloves, hand knit scarves, queen sized comforter, games, toys, books, puzzles, play dough, shampoo, candles, adult coloring books, colored pencils, baby clothes and diapers.

\$325 in cash was used to buy:

\$100 gas card at Bob & Mike's in Saco, \$50 Reny's card, \$100 Market Basket card, additional hats, gloves and socks so that each family member received them.

A "family" bag was given to each family which contained gently used games, small rag rugs, cocoa mix, candy canes, cookies and a box of chocolates.

Thank you *all* for supporting this BoT effort to give back to our community! We all pulled together a wonderful holiday surprise for these 2 families!

You are welcome to speak informally with any member of the Committee on Ministries.

Please read the Conflict Brochure developed by this committee and follow the Conflict Resolution Pathway that applies to your situation. When needed, the CoM will assist in developing a mediation plan for all involved parties.

Keep in mind that the CoM doesn't handle anonymous input. Be assured that information communicated will be handled with appropriate confidentiality.


To learn more about our faith and practice:
