# March Theme ~ Sacrifice



The important thing is to be able at any moment to sacrifice what you are for what you can become. from *Charles Dubois, Spiritual Divorce* by Debbie Ford

It's that time of year again, when you are asked to dig deep and renew your pledge of financial support to the work of the church. As we reach the one year mark of on-line worship services (our first Zoom Sunday was March 22<sup>nd</sup>, 2020), we have learned much about how to be a community during difficult and strange times – most especially, how to continue to support one another as our needs and available resources constantly change.

We have learned, for sure, how to make sacrifices.

Sacrifice: the act of giving up something that you want to keep especially in order to get something else or to help someone, often as an act of faith.

It can seem hard to continue being generous with our money and ourselves when outcomes are so uncertain. We have no idea what will be in our individual and communal lives. There is no guarantee that things will ever go back to "normal", and so it may seem prudent to hang on to whatever resources we still have, just in case.

But the thing is, even though it may feel like it sometimes, life hasn't stopped; the world has not stopped turning and there are still people in great need. Our faith is calling us, more than ever, to *act* on our principles and convictions; to find new ways of being in the world that support justice work and liberation for all.

And, just as importantly, we continue to need each other and this community to keep us strong and grounded.

So this month, as we talk about money, and what it means to give up things we would really rather hang on to, let us keep open minds and generous hearts, trusting that what we do for one, we do for all.



#### **Conflict Resolution Process**

We understand that conflict can be an inevitable part of a healthy community and can serve as an opportunity for growth and development. As members of this congregation, it is incumbent on all of us to handle conflict in ways that are reflected in our covenant.

Please read the Conflict Brochure developed by this committee and follow the Conflict Resolution Pathway that applies to your situation. When needed, the CoM will assist in developing a mediation plan for all involved parties.

Keep in mind that the CoM doesn't handle anonymous input. Be assured that information communicated will be handled with appropriate confidentiality.


To learn more about our faith and practice:
