April Theme ~ Truth



From NPR Book Reviews: "Writing a one-volume history of the United States is, obviously, a daunting task. There's way too much to pack into one book. Lepore acknowledges that she's not able to cover everything: 'No one could. Much is missing in these pages.' She has chosen to look at America through the lens of the promises America has made to itself, and whether we've kept them."

Following is an excerpt from the epilogue of Jill Lapore's 2018 book *These Truths: A History of the United States*.

Can a people govern themselves by reflection and choice? Hamilton had wanted to know, or are they fated to be ruled, forever, by accident and force, lashed by the violence of each wave of a surging sea?

The ship of state lurched and reeled. Liberals, blown down by the slightest breeze, had neglected to trim the ship's sails, leaving the canvas to flap and tear in a rising wind, the rigging flailing. Huddled below decks, they had failed to plot a course, having lost sight of the horizon and their grasp on any compass. On deck, conservatives had pulled up the ship's planking to make bonfires of rage: they had courted the popular will by demolishing the idea of truth itself, smashing the ship's very mast.

It would fall to a new generation of Americans, reckoning what their forebears had wrought, to fathom the depths of the doom-black sea. If they meant to repair the tattered ship, they would need to fell the most majestic pine in a deer-haunted forest and raise a new mast that could pierce the clouded sky. With sharpened adzes, they would have to hew timbers of cedar and oak into planks, straight and true. They would need to drive home nails with the untiring swing of mighty arms and, with needles held tenderly in nimble fingers stitch new sails out of the rugged canvas of their goodwill. Knowing that heat and sparks and hammers and anvils are not enough, they would have to forge an anchor in the glowing fire of their ideals. And to steer that ship through wind and wave, they would need to learn an ancient and nearly forgotten art: how to navigate by the stars.

REFLECTIONS FROM THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES



Spring is upon us, and never have I felt the true weight and meaning of the season as I do in 2021.

The natural world, as it always does, is beginning to rise from its winter slumber. Creatures newly awakened from hibernation, and those who were awake through the lean times of the past months, are emerging from their burrows and dens to find a landscape not yet flush with green life, but with the tiny buds and warm afternoons that promise the better times ahead. These warm afternoons still give way to frigid nights, but those grow fewer and shorter as the maples yield their sweet sap.

So too, is the human world awaking from its long hibernation. It has been over a year since we abandoned our favorite restaurants, closed the doors to our churches, cancelled family gatherings, and moved from the warmth of community to an almost fully virtual existence of Zoom meetings and working from home. Now, as the vaccines roll out, we feel that warmth of the spring sun coaxing us from our slumber. We are still not safe, but an end to the crisis is in sight. As with the animal kingdom, the world is not quite ready for us, but the promise is there as the trees bud and the crocuses begin to poke through the barely thawed earth.

As we lurked indoors over the last year, the earth began to heal itself. Air and water pollution decreased by as much as 75% in some places, and fish populations began to grow after decades of decline. The promise of spring is given a greater strength by our time away.

In the last year, we have learned a great deal. We have learned which of us are truly essential to a functioning society, and just how many jobs can be done at a distance. We learned just how fragile our economic systems are, and to what degree they must function for people to survive. We saw the strengths and weaknesses of our schools and institutions. We learned to conserve and saw the environmental changes that are possible. Most of all, we gained a new understanding of the things that are truly important to us as human beings, as a society, and as a fundamentally interconnected world: Our connections to each other, our love of art and music and stories, our desire to create and build and make change in the world.

And there are signs of what we can accomplish. We produced multiple vaccines in record time. We had a mostly peaceful transfer of power in Washington. Issues of healthcare and supporting our society's most vulnerable people are once again on the center stage. Millions of Americans found the time to bake bread, to learn new skills, and to reacquaint themselves with old passions. We are awakening to this spring, more than any I can remember, with a fresh set of eyes and a new understanding of our needs and capabilities.

Now, in these weeks of renewal and new beginnings, is the time to commit to making a better post-Covid world. We can do so much better. Look to the warmer days ahead and make that promise of spring, to plant the seeds that will bloom in the weeks and months to come.

from Choir Director, Ellie Rolnick










April Share the Plate: Saco Bay Trails



Conflict Resolution Process

You are welcome to speak informally with any member of the Committee on Ministries: Niki Norman, Pat Campbell, and Odette Dansereau.

Please read the Conflict Brochure developed by this committee and follow the Conflict Resolution Pathway that applies to your situation. When needed, the CoM will assist in developing a mediation plan for all involved parties.

Keep in mind that the CoM doesn't handle anonymous input. Be assured that information communicated will be handled with appropriate confidentiality.


