

# **Shay's Musings**

# May Theme ~ Simplicity



Simplicity is not the pursuit of austerity but an ongoing life exploration that asks us to carefully examine what truly contributes to well-being and what undermines inner balance, happiness, and spaciousness. ~ Christina Feldman from Heart of Wisdom, Mind of Calm

It's always hard to write these newsletter articles without knowing what will be happening in our world or in your lives when you read them. I'm writing this on Thursday, April 22<sup>nd</sup> - at least a week before you will read it, two days after you all received two letters from your Boards and me, and three days before we'll all sit down to start talking about what's happening. So where will things be in a week, when you open your email and find this article waiting for you?

I don't know the answer to that question. What I do know is that we will have many conversations over the next few weeks as we figure out what's next, and I know there will be many emotions and ideas and debates, and sometimes it will all feel very heavy.

So, how about I write about something not-so-heavy right now?

In her book *The Life-Changing Magic of Tidying Up: The Japanese Art of Decluttering and Organizing,* Japanese organizing consultant Marie Kondo says, "The question of what you want to own is actually the question of how you want to live your life."

When my partner Diana and I were finally able to combine households and move into a shared apartment last summer, we made a deliberate choice towards voluntary simplicity – a decluttering of our lives, both materially and emotionally. With each item we packed, we followed Marie Kondo's advice to pick it up, hold it for a moment, and ask, "Does this spark joy in me?"

Ultimately, we shifted our frame of reference from "What do I want to get rid of?" to "What do I want to keep?" This led to many Goodwill trips and dump runs, many Facebook Marketplace and Craigslist ads. And as we moved into our new apartment and unpacked and found ourselves with more space than we needed, everything changed. Even Diana's son Aidan got involved, making a plan that allowed him to "practice" for packing for college – he chose seven plastic bins and committed to fitting all of his belongings in those bins, nothing more.

If you were to be a fly on our wall now, you would often hear one of us exclaiming, "It feels so spacious in here!" We feel like we can breathe, like our lives have expanded and with that physical expansion, our minds and hearts are free to expand as well.

We have to be vigilant, of course, to not fill up that spaciousness with more *stuff*, and sometimes we do better than others. But then we just make another Goodwill run and get back on track, always asking ourselves, "Does this make me happy?" We are learning that simplicity is not about depriving ourselves of things, but about making sure that the things we do have are worth having.

# REFLECTIONS FROM THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES



I recently attended a Zoom workshop put on by the UUA Northeast District entitled "Planning Worship for the Post-Pandemic World." It was both a hopeful and reassuring session. We were reminded that the transition out of the pandemic will be trickier than the way in, which was very sudden. It will be gradual and require a great deal of discernment. The way ahead is not clear and it will be of the utmost importance to keep our mission before us at all times - our "north star."

Will we be able to jump into in-person church, every Sunday? Probably not. Will we be able to offer a multi-platform streaming service? Perhaps, over time. The group discernment process was described as follows: There are a lot of options before us. We each have our own perspective, and by listening to others' perspectives, we inevitably come up with a whole new one. Being honest (even when others don't agree), being open, inviting difference, being willing to change, and trusting that others are willing to change is our way ahead.

Emerging from the trauma of this pandemic is not going to happen quickly, nor should it. Recovery takes time and people are going to reemerge at their own pace. The message that was repeated throughout the workshop was: Have grace for yourself, grace for others, and go slowly as you make adjustments along the way. Correcting the course may well turn out to be a process that could take *years*; resist the pressure to have it all figured out "yesterday."

We ask for your grace, your patience, and your perspective as we work through this process of group discernment together.

#### **Conflict Resolution Process**

The Unitarian Universalist Church of Saco and Biddeford is committed to fostering right relations among its members, friends, and staff.

We understand that conflict can be an inevitable part of a healthy community and can serve as an opportunity for growth and development. As members of this congregation, it is incumbent on all of us to handle conflict in ways that are reflected in our covenant.

You are welcome to speak informally with any member of the Committee on Ministries: Niki Norman, Pat Campbell, and Odette Dansereau.

Please read the Conflict Brochure developed by this committee and follow the Conflict Resolution Pathway that applies to your situation. When needed, the CoM will assist in developing a mediation plan for all involved parties.

Keep in mind that the CoM doesn't handle anonymous input. Be assured that information communicated will be handled with appropriate confidentiality.


To learn more about our faith and practice:

There are seven principles which Unitarian Universalist congregations affirm and promote:



#### Our Membership

Those who sign the Membership Book agree to sustain our church through continuing contributions of time, effort and financial support. All members are part of the non-profit corporation that owns the church, and they govern it through democratic process in which each one is entitled to be heard. Members elect a Board of Trustees and must also approve the "call" of a minister to our pulpit. By participating in our worship, events and activities, you'll get a sense of how this congregation might work in your life, and you in the life of the congregation. As you discover the privileges and responsibilities of membership, we recommend that you take the time to:

- · Attend a Sharing Your Spiritual Journey orientation offered by the Membership Committee to find out more about Unitarian Universalism and our church's history and traditions.
- · Attend church for a while to get to know the community and think about whether you share in our common values and feel ready to make a commitment to the shared spiritual journey.
  - · Decide your financial and time commitment to this church community.

When you're ready, speak to the chair of Membership or president about signing the Membership Book!
