This book, with writing prompts, is a wonderful tool in writing groups as well as when one works solo or with a therapist. My most recent book is "Poems for a World on Fire: Meditations on Hope", which deals with the current day issues of global warming, migrations, hunger, Covid-19 and more.

Reverend Niki Norman is a graduate of ChIME - the Chaplaincy Institute of Maine, and was ordained by ChIME in 2020. Also a member of the UUCSB, Rev Niki is very grateful for the love and support from the the UUCSB congregation.

Reverend Myra Robinson was ordained in 2016 at the Chaplaincy Institute of Maine (ChIME) where she currently works as Faculty Advisor and Community Programs Coordinator. She offers clergy services throughout Southern Maine, including her signature Affirmantra Workshops. She has been a member of the UUCSB congregation for over 30 years; serving the community through hospice work, respite caregiving and mentoring incarcerated women. Myra is a musician, a poet, a singer/songwriter, officiant, teacher, and grandmother. She lives in Scarborough with her spouse and two naughty rescue cats.

We met recently (masked and distanced) at the church and discussed the role of the Caring Connection Team in the absence of a minister for our congregation. Pastoral Care services are available on request from either Niki Norman or Keith

Walker, both of whom have training in pastoral care. In addition, money has been transferred to the Caring Connection from the former Minister's Discretionary Fund to disburse to church members with short-term emergency needs (e.g. heat, food, rent...)

Even in such uncertain times, we can still make phone calls, send cards, Zoom, visit outside at a safe distance, deliver meals, etc. The committee has a list of people who are willing, ready and able to serve. We will reach out to revise this list during the next few weeks.

Pantry Donation Suggestions:

[All suggestions: preferably plant-based and organic (if available/cost-efficient)]

Canned produce and veggies (like beans!)

Canned soups, like garden vegetable, black bean, and butternut squash*

Baby food in pouches

Peanut butter, or peanut-free alternatives such as almond or cashew butter*

Dried pastas (especially whole-grain) and dried whole grains like brown rice, farro, and quinoa (they are long-lasting and versatile)



Popcorn (this whole grain makes a healthy snack when lightly seasoned)

Flour and/or whole-wheat flour (a staple that allows for more flexibility in meals)

Oatmeal, healthy breakfast cereals, and granola bars

Variety of bready items, such as whole-wheat bread, naan, pita bread, and corn tortillas

* (Please, no cans or glass containers during freezing weather).

Conflict Resolution Process

We understand that conflict can be an inevitable part of a healthy community and can serve as an opportunity for growth and development. As members of this congregation, it is incumbent on all of us to handle conflict in ways that are reflected in our covenant.

You are welcome to speak informally with any member of the Committee on Ministries (Niki Norman, Pat Campbell, and Odette Dansereau).

Please read the Conflict Brochure developed by this committee and follow the Conflict Resolution Pathway that applies to your situation. When needed, the CoM will assist in developing a mediation plan for all involved parties.

Keep in mind that the CoM doesn't handle anonymous input. Be assured that information communicated will be handled with appropriate confidentiality.


To learn more about our faith and practice:
