Before we celebrate our fresh, new year, Christmas is nearly upon us. I found some interesting facts that I thought you might enjoy about some of our Christmas doings.

- The pines we hang at Christmastime have an origin in Egypt and Rome. Those folks decorated with the greens during the Winter Solstice to signify that Spring would soon return.
- The song "Jingle Bells" was originally written for Thanksgiving.
- "Silent Night" has been recorded in different versions and copyrighted 733 times since 1978.
- Santa Claus has his own postal code! It is: HOHOHO. The Postal Service usually processes around 910 million packages and handles about 15 billion pieces of mail during the Christmas season!
- Candy canes at Christmas came from a Choirmaster who gave them out to children to keep them quiet during services. In 1847, they became ornaments for Christmas trees.
- And, finally, the Rockefeller Christmas tree tradition began in 1931 when a construction worker put up a small Charlie Brown tree near the current location where we put up the large one now. In 1932, the fellas put another C.B. tree up and decorated it with lights. This tradition has evolved into the majestic tree we set up every year which sports 25,000 lights to the delight of everyone who sees it!

Around the Building

The big issue for us this last month or so has been the leaks we have from our roof areas. Our contractor had suggested several remedies for these. He was unable to get to us until a week or so ago. At this time our areas of major concern are sealed up. However in the process of snugging things up, several structural issues came to light.

The first was in the back of the Sanctuary/annex. Sort of where the organ and the side wall meet. You may recall that last spring we had several clapboards missing in that area. Over the summer those clapboards were replaced. Ceiling tiles, damaged by leaks in the archives were replaced, only to be re-damaged by new leaks higher up. The issue, it was discovered, is a failure of roof and clapboards in that area as well as underlying structural damage that has been there probably for decades. Seems roofers replaced shingles, but did not address the underlying supports.

The second area we have recently addressed is the leak by the Parish Hall Parlor chimney and the Parlor ceiling. Here we have discovered that the chimney is so much in disrepair that water is oozing through the bricks into the ceiling. There is also damage in the eaves particularly on the corner by the Peace Pole.

The good news is that all these areas are sealed, sort of like liquid bandage for buildings! I have asked the contractor to put a cap on that chimney. He will do that this week if the weather holds.

The B&G folks will be gathering information about how to correct the structural issues. We hope to have a plan for this in the spring.

We are fortunate to have a as advisors Mark Gotjen, Russ O'Berry and Ben Caron. I expect we will be talking to them as we formulate our plans.

On a sad note, long time B&G member Tom Muise passed away recently. Tom's energy and commitment to the work of B&G will be greatly missed.

Bring what you want; take what you need.

Pantry Donation Suggestions:

[All suggestions: preferably plant-based and organic (if available/cost-efficient)]

- Baby food in pouches
- Popcorn (this whole grain makes a healthy snack when lightly seasoned)
- Dried pastas (especially whole-grain) and dried whole grains like brown rice, farro, and quinoa (they are long-lasting and versatile)
- Flour and/or whole-wheat flour (a staple that allows for more flexibility in meals)
- Oatmeal, healthy breakfast cereals, and granola bars
- Variety of bready items, such as whole-wheat bread, naan, pita bread, and corn tortillas

As the weather warms, the following are great additions, but not during freezing weather:

- Canned produce and veggies (like beans!)
- Canned soups, like garden vegetable, black bean, and butternut squash
- Peanut butter, or peanut-free alternatives such as almond or cashew butter


