Sermon Notes

May marks the 5th month of our 6th month spiritual pilgrimage together. After the toil and trouble, after the sunburn and swelling, after all the anticpation and expectation comes the approach, the sighting. There comes the climax of the journey. The encounter. It is when the traveler attempts to slide through the thin membrane in the universe and return to the garden of origin, where humans lived in concert with all of creation. A full and true ONE ness. What an amazing part of our pilgrimage that is synchronized with Mother's Day, with the return of flowers and bees.

Our first encounter will be with the earth. On May 1 we will have an earth communion. I invite you to bring a tablespoon or 2 of earth from your yard or from a potted plant. We will mix these together and once mixed send everyone home with the newly mixed soil. This earth communion symbolizes and actualizes that our community can never be separated again. Once our soils are mixed they can never be unmixed. I invite you to bring some in a baggie or containers so that you can leave with some of the mixed earth when you leave.

We will also explore encountering each other and encountering the community in new ways later in the month. I look forward to spending May with you!

Faith in Action Team: An Invitation

After a two-year Covid-induced hiatus, maybe it's time to get our Faith in Action Team back together!

[This is an unauthorized, last-minute newsletter submission. I'm acting alone, but hopefully not for long! — Randa Thomas]

I have loved being a part of FiAT! I loved that we always tried "to put faith into our action and action into our faith." We call ourselves the Faith in Action Team with the idea that we don't all have to be working on the same project to be on the same team. I loved that meetings incorporated shared spiritual practices to help us recognize our limits and bring deeper meaning to our actions. I loved that we had a non-hierarchical structure with no chairperson or official membership and that we used a consensus model because we were learning about the limitations and contradictions of the patriarchy from which many of our "traditional" church structures had grown. And we did good work!

Now that church life is starting to look a little more 'normal' I'm hoping you are as eager as I am to get into some social justice work together. This will mean spending some time getting to know each other and learning about individuals' priorities and passions. It will require rebuilding some structures for communication and norms for meetings. We will need to figure out how we will decide on things and who will do what.

This is my broad vision for how we would get started:

After settling on some of the nitty gritty of actual meetings, we start close to home, clarifying our church's mission and evaluating how we're doing with that. And we just start on something. Here are some close-to-home ideas. We could:

- Learn about the Green Sanctuary recertification process and tune up our collective practices.
- Host a neighborhood clean up followed by a picnic in the park.
- Figure out how to make Wi-Fi available to the neighborhood kids.
- Get active with MUUSAN or a local group that is already doing excellent work.

Around the Building

Everything is coming up green around the UUCSB - both inside and outside! Take a look at the daffodils, crocuses and other plants around our yard. Taking our cue from Spring, we have finished painting the Green Room.

Our contractor is about to start the work on our Parish Hall chimney, eaves, connector roof, and front of the Sanctuary.

As reported last month, we have a recurrence of issues on the connector roof. The roofer says that this may be due to the way the wind blows around that part of the building. To avoid further damage we will try to stretch our limited funding to cover these repairs.

Remember that "freeze up" we had this winter? Well, when Jane was dusting the Sanctuary window sills (dead flies pile up even in Winter!); she discovered a leak in our heat pipes below the middle window on the west side of the Sanctuary. This was most likely because of a crack that happened during that freeze up in February and just grew with time. Thanks to our wonderful folks at Pine State, this got fixed in short order.

The unexpected heating system issues cost us about \$4600. A big chunk of money for a small church with small financial resources.



You are welcome to speak informally with any member of the Committee on Ministries (Niki Norman, Pat Campbell, and Odette Dansereau).

Please read the Conflict Brochure developed by this committee and follow the Conflict Resolution Pathway that applies to your situation. When needed, the CoM will assist in developing a mediation plan for all involved parties.

Keep in mind that the CoM doesn't handle anonymous input. Be assured that information communicated will be handled with appropriate confidentiality.


To learn more about our faith and practice:
