• Thoughts from Rev. Lori

It is Good Friday. In the Christian tradition this is the sacred day that marks when Jesus was crucified. From this sacred marker, people recognize the absence of God in our midst. When my daughter was younger, I would take her to anime Boston which always corresponds with Easter weekend. An anime event is one where all the attendants dress up like their favorite characters, usually from cartoons or comic books. For me it was enjoyable to see so many humans coming together in a peaceful, joyful way. A little bit like a huge Halloween party. The event started Friday at 3:00 and went through Sunday at 12:00. We milled about this 3000+ person event in the Heinz Convention Center in Boston over the course of the weekend looking at booths, and listening to presenters and mostly ogling the attendees. On Saturday, we spotted someone dressed up as Jesus. My daughter said, "He's not supposed to be here, he hasn't been resurrected yet." I was delighted to realize that she had been paying attention all those years of Sunday school.

These next 36 hours, between crucifixion and resurrection, are symbolic to Christians of the absence of the living God. His life was tangibly the embodiment of the Old Testament. Rather than a set of practices, traditions and commandments, Jesus came into the world to SHOW what that looked like by living them out, not just reading and interpreting words, but actually contextualizing them and being the Word, the exemplar. The greatest commandment as stated in Matthew 22 is to love God with your whole heart, mind and soul and love your neighbor as yourself. I guess that means that LOVE is what it all comes down to. Jesus lived a life of love, siding with those who probably needed a little extra as they had circumstances that kept them on the margins of society. He embodied that love, resisting authority that would exclude people that didn't or couldn't meet the letters of the law and rules of the religious institutions. He chose love over institution. Our streams of faith flow down from the Christian tradition. And like it or not, the framework of our particular society has been crafted from a Judeo-Christian structure. All of this to say that we are formed from this assumption.

Friday afternoon through Sunday morning marks a time of disembodied contemplation. I invite you to take a deep dive into your faith this weekend. Assess where you are at, and what informs you. What does the term God mean for you? What is your north star that you make meaning with? How do you relate to that north star? Through prayer, music, walking in nature? How do you relate to it through community? What and when do you feel disconnected to it? How do you restore that connection when you feel disconnected? What are the gifts and graces in this for you and what sense

of purpose does it give you? Write this out for yourself. This time is figuratively the dark night of the soul. I invite you to think about your faith on a contemplative level so that when we come together again on Sunday, we can celebrate your/our living into our faith on Sunday and for this next year. In costumes or hats or in any other way you wish!
