June Share the Plate: Equality Community Center

The Equality Community Center, a 501c3 non-profit org, is a collaborative workplace for LGBTQ+ and allied social justice seeking non-profit organizations, including EqualityMaine, MaineTransNet, Pride Portland, PFLAG, Khmer Maine, Cross Cultural Community Services, Democracy Maine, Sexual Assault Response Services, Through These Doors, Prevention Action Change and the Kindling Collective.

Located at 15 Casco Street in downtown Portland, the Center provides a safer and more inclusive gathering space with social and educational programming for all, working to support the most marginalized in our communities.

Additionally, the organization is in the midst of a capital campaign - Building and Supporting Community - to raise the critical funds needed to complete renovations to the new home and finalize all the initial planning to break ground on a 54-unit affordable housing complex for LGBTQ+ older adults, their families and allied community members which will be located right next to the ECC!



Special Music for June





Food for thought.....

Each morning at the breakfast table Betsey and I read something spiritual. Recently we have been reading from

Serving with Grace: Lay Leadership as a Spiritual Practice by Erik Walker Wikstrom. I know many of you have this book, but have you read it?

We are a small congregation. What we are called to do to keep this church running can often feel overwhelming and time consuming. After all, we mostly come to church for spiritual fulfillment, not to work on committees and events. How do we find balance between our spiritual needs and the running of our church? I found an answer in Wikstrom's book.

"There is yet another level which opens up most fully when you see service to your congregation as a spiritual practice, when you look at leadership through a spiritual lens.....leadership can provide countless opportunities to learn more about yourself – your strengths and challenges – and how you work with others. You will have the chance to practice patience and learn about listening, really listening, to people with whom you disagree yet who may well have something you need to hear. These are valuable lessons. And they are only the beginning."

Our church depends on each of us. For some, that may mean serving on the Board of Trustees or on a committee. For others it may mean working on the yard sale or Christmas Fair or other church events. And for others it may be as simple as signing up to be an usher, providing flowers for Sunday worship, or setting or cleaning up for after-service social hours. It could even be as simple as making a pot of coffee.

I have made closer connections to people in our congregation by currently serving on the Board of Trustees, or on a variety of committees over the years. I particularly love greeting folks as they arrive at church each Sunday and having conversations with visitors at our social hour. I look for people who are standing alone with their cup of coffee. Chatting with them is an opportunity to erase the awkwardness of being new and to have conversation that may encourage that visitor to return to our church. These are spiritual practices, for me.

What are your spiritual practices? What can you do for our church community, and how can your service become a spiritual practice for you?

My View: Creating Climate Justice by Breaking Free from Fossil Fuels

Our church's oil burner is on its last legs and needs to be replaced. I hope we can find the courage, energy, vision, money, creativity and whatever else it takes to choose a heating method that will free us from fossil fuels.

We know that we are truly in a climate crisis. We know how harmful the extraction and burning of fossil fuels is to our environment. We know that the most vulnerable are the ones who pay the biggest price. We know that we are *not* the most vulnerable, yet we are part of the interconnected web of existence. How can we fully live our UU principals unless we do everything we can possibly do to stop contributing to the problem?

The easiest and cheapest thing is to replace our dying oil burner with another, more efficient oil burner. But even a more efficient oil burner still uses non-renewable energy. We have an estimate for installing wood pellet boilers. Delivery of pellets is similar to that of oil, and the system would fit with our current duct and blower system. After installation, fuel costs per BTU are significantly lower.

A wood pellet system will cost more than an oil burner. However, with significant renewable energy rebates, the cost will come closer and its heating efficiency will save money throughout its life. Fuel costs will not fluctuate unpredictably as oil does. Powered by our principles, we can find or raise the difference in the cost of a renewable energy system.

We need to make a decision very soon. Since we will need to find money for whatever choice we make, there will be an informational congregational meeting to discuss our options. This is a great opportunity for our church to break free from fossil fuels, to live our principles in a concrete way, and to become a true Green Sanctuary

Around the Building - June 2023

If you have been following the B&G notes in the Messenger, you understand we have had some big issues to deal with. The roof is scheduled for fixing, the main entrance doors are still in process, and the BoT has looked at several ways to address our need for a reliable central source of heat. FIAT has entered these discussions. In the next several weeks you will hear much more about our findings. You will be asked at the Annual Meeting on June 11 to vote on a way to resolve the immediate heating issue. Please ask any Board member the questions you have about this important issue.

B&G member, Jane Perkins, has installed grab bars for the stairs leading to the balcony. Jane has also donated many hand sewn table cloths and napkins to our dwindling supply of linens.

As a result of B&G contact with Community Solar, the church is now in line for this type of power and FIAT will be sponsoring a workshop with Community Solar to get new folks signed up. That means that the UUCSB will get \$50 for every new household that signs up as a result of this workshop.

We are looking forward to working with Finance and FIAT as we journey toward Green Sanctuary 2030.
