
## Small Group Ministry (re)Starting In April!


### **Step 2: Opportunity Assessment**

### **UU PRINCIPLES AND SOURCES ARE BEING UPDATED**

### We are a Living Tradition.

We UUs don't have a creed, written once and maintained for all time. Instead, we have a statement of values (Article II containing our Principles and Sources) that is to be examined regularly to ascertain that they continue to reflect who we are.

### Our by-laws require a revision process.

Our by-laws say that every fifteen years we must review Article II, and that time is here. Over the past several years an Article II Study Commission has been re-examining the Principles and Sources. Last year's General Assembly devoted a large amount of time to hear and discuss amendments proposed by delegates. Here is thefinal draft of its proposed revision to Article II.

### The "new look"

Rather than replacing the seven principles, it is seen as expanding our statement of values to include commitment and action. It reflects some of what we have learned since the last major revision in 1987, largely in the areas of diversity and care for the Earth.

### Watch for further information

Future Friday Flyers and church events will discuss these changes in more detail.

Join me at General Assembly this June when the member congregations of the UUA will vote to accept or reject this proposed revision of Article II. This year's GA will be totally virtual; you can participate from the comfort of your own living room! Full registration, entitling you to take part in a wide variety of workshops, worship services, featured speakers, etc. is \$280 until March 15 when it will increase to \$315, <a href="https://www.uua.org/ga/registration">https://www.uua.org/ga/registration</a>. Delegate only registration is by donation. Each congregation is entitled to a limited number of delegates, based on the size of the congregation.


